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Operation Sticker Shock





Alleghany Highlands Community Services, Alleghany Highlands Healthy Youth Coalition and Alleghany County Sheriff's Office have partnered to implement a Project Sticker Shock in our community. The event began at the Exxon on South Durant Road in Covington, VA. Sticker Shock, is a youth led prevention program. It is designed to support existing, and encourage new community activism, cooperative efforts, and community capacity building to combat underage drinking and its related problems, specifically adults providing alcohol to minors.

"Project Sticker Shock" seeks to reach those persons 21 years of age or older who might illegally purchase alcohol and provide it to minors. Youth will visit participating retailers accompanied by the Alleghany County Sheriff's Office, members from the Alleghany Highlands Healthy Youth Coalition and Alleghany Highlands Community Services. They will place prevention stickers on multi-packs of beer, wine coolers and other alcohol products that might appeal to underage drinkers. The stickers display a warning message about the penalties for purchasing or providing alcohol to minors.

The project represents a partnership between youth, licensed establishments, parents and community members, prevention professionals, and law enforcement with the goal of educating persons 21 and older of the underage law and raising public awareness about underage drinking.

Retail partners participating included Petticoat Junction, One Stop Mart - Clifton Forge, The Rusty Hinge - Iron Gate, The Snak Shak, BP Fast Break - Clifton Forge, Whitey's One Stop and Stop In Exxon (Excerpt from Highlands Media Group's Facebook page).

Tracey Heidleberg, our second presenter, spoke about her time in recovery, how Alleghany Highlands Community Services has helped her, and her journey to becoming a Peer Specialist. Lindsey Livesay, our final presenter, offered information about what services the CSB offers and how to get help.

Overall, the event was a huge success! The Virginian Review was able to do an article about the event that made the front page of the local newspaper. Six community partners set up information booths. The State Police brought their DUI stimulator. Drunk goggles were available, and the program Intox-o-clock, which shows you the effects of drinking and BAC level, was available to the community.
